The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) is the lead U.S. Government agency working in **international development**.

USAID works to foster understanding and promote peace around the world through our numerous missions, cooperation with partners, and investment in local communities.

In support of America's foreign policy, the U.S. Agency for International Development leads the U.S. Government's international development and disaster assistance through partnerships and investments that save lives, reduce poverty, strengthen democratic governance, and help people emerge from humanitarian crises and progress beyond assistance.

NOTICE OF FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

The majority of USAID's funds are awarded competitively through contracts, grants, or cooperative agreements.

- **Contracts:** USAID purchases technical assistance services, goods, products, or other services from a responsible party to implement a project as directed by the Agency.
- **Grants:** USAID provides funds to a responsible grantee to carry out a program with little direct involvement.
- **Cooperative Agreements:** USAID provides funds to a partner but has more substantial involvement and contact with the partner during the life of the program.

ANNUAL PROGRAM STATEMENT (APS)

Solicit creative approaches to an issue of concern of a Mission, Bureau, or Independent Office:

- <u>Higher Education for Leadership, Innovation, and Exchange (HELIX) Annual Program Statement</u> (APS) aims to improve partner country higher education individual, institutional, and organizational capacity for change by supporting opportunities for partnerships, scholarships, exchanges, fellowships, internships, apprenticeships, work-based learning, research, communities of practice, and other relevant forms of capacity development and change management. While HELIX itself is not a RFA, there is currently one Addendum under the APS that is accepting concept notes.
 - The <u>Supporting Holistic and Actionable Research in Education</u> (SHARE) Addendum to HELIX has an overarching goal of advancing USAID learning priorities in the global education sector as a global good to improve education and learning outcomes. Concept notes are due May 8.
- The <u>YouthPower 2 Annual Program Statement</u> (APS) provides a vehicle for engaging with youth-led and youth-serving organizations, among others, and systems to generate cross-sectoral, positive youth development outcomes. The APS disseminates information to prospective Applicants so they may develop and submit Concept Notes in response to the addenda and ultimately to be considered for USAID funding.
 - The <u>Youth Excel</u> addendum is currently accepting concept notes to support capacity building of youth-led and youth-serving organizations. Concept note are due May 8.

ANNUAL PROGRAM STATEMENT (APS)

- <u>Science, Technology, Innovation, and Partnerships</u> (STIP) in Higher Education Program. There are not any current addendum opportunities, but they are posted regularly
- <u>Development Innovation Ventures (DIV)</u> is USAID's open innovation program that tests and scales creative solutions to any global development challenge. By investing in breakthrough innovations driven by rigorous evidence, USAID impacts millions of lives at a fraction of the usual cost. DIV has an open call for concepts under their APS.
